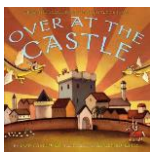


Books about Counting

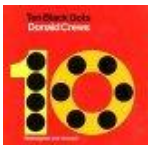
Baker, Keith. [1-2-3 Peas](#)

Each car on the train has one more zoo animal than the one before, from the first car with an elephant to the last with ten birds. (PICTURE BOOK CAR)



Crews, Donald. [Ten Black Dots](#)

A counting book which shows what can be done with ten black dots - - one can make a sun, two a fox's eyes, or eight the wheels of a train. (PICTURE BOOK CRE)



Degman, Lori. [1 Zany Zoo](#)

When one fearless fox grabs the zookeeper's keys and opens all the cages, increasing numbers of animals behave in most unusual ways. (PICTURE BOOK DEG)

A little guinea pig is quite lonely until, one by one, nine others, plus ten of their moms or dads, add to the general excitement. (PICTURE BOOK DUK)



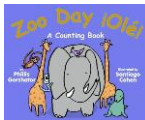
Formento, Alison. [This Tree Counts!](#)

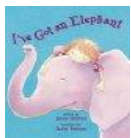
Fox, Mem. [Let's Count Goats](#)

The reader is invited to count goats of many shapes, sizes, hobbies, and professions. (PICTURE BOOK FOX)



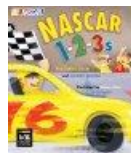
Gershator, Phillis. [Zoo Day Ole: A Counting Book](#)

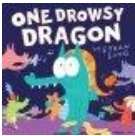
Jacobs, Paul Dubois. [NASCAR 1 2 3's](#)

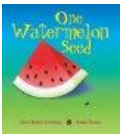
Kromhout, Rindert. [1 2 3 Little Donkey](#)

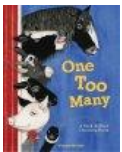
Long, Ethan. [One Drowsy Dragon](#)

Concise and clever text introduces color and rhythm with the illustrations making counting a snap. (PICTURE BOOK LOT)



Marino, Gianna. [One Too Many: A Seek and Find Counting Book](#)

Children count from one jumping flea to twelve frisky animals until, at last, they reach one too many. (PICTURE BOOK MAR)



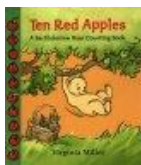
Martin, Bill. [Chicka Chicka 1-2-3](#)

Numbers from one to one hundred climb to the top of an apple tree in this rhyming chant. (PICTURE BOOK MAR)



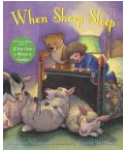
McGrath, Barbara Barbeiri. [Teddy Bear Counting](#)

Teddy bears introduce numbers from one to twelve, as well as colors and shapes. (PICTURE BOOK MCG)



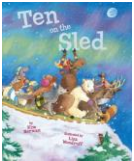
Miller, Virginia. [Ten Red Apples](#)

Norman, Kimberly. [Ten on the Sled](#)

Animals fall off a speeding sled one by one until only a lonely caribou is left, chasing a giant snowball that has engulfed the falling animals. (PICTURE BOOK NOR)



Otoshi, Kathryn. [Zero](#)

Zero, dismayed by her big, empty, roundness, tries to force herself into the shape of the much-admired One, but must finally accept that she can only be Zero. (PICTURE BOOK OTO)



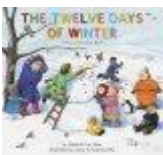
Parenteau, Shirley. [One Frog Sang](#)

A cumulative counting verse enumerating spring-related gifts that a teacher gives to the distinctive children in her kindergarten class. (PICTURE BOOK ROS)



Rose, Deborah Lee. [The Twelve Days of Winter: A School Counting Book](#)

A cumulative counting verse in which a child lists items pertaining to winter given to him by his teacher, from twelve treats for tasting to one bird feeder in a snowy tree. (PICTURE BOOK ROS)

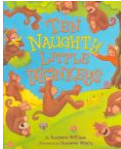
Sarfatti, Esther. [Counting by Twos](#)
