How to Participate

Step 1: Find a comfortable place to watch birds for **15 minutes or more**, at least once over the four days of **February 14-17, 2025**.

Step 2: Count all the birds you **see or hear** and note them on the **Bird Count Tally Sheet**. Fill out one tally sheet per day you observe.

Your data will be used by scientists to analyze bird populations and migrations, so it is important that everyone count birds in the same way. For each species (type of bird) you see, keep track of the **highest number of individual birds that you observe at any one time**. Be careful not to count the same bird over and over! Don't add another Blue Jay to your tally each time you see a Blue Jay. You could be seeing the same bird. Instead, count the total number you see at one time and then report the highest number.

For example:

Species of Bird	Tallies	Highest Group Tally Enter this # in the tally sheet.
Blue Jay	3, 5, 4, 2	5
Cardinal	2, 1, 3, 2	3

Step 3: Return the **Bird Count Tally Sheet(s)** to the library. We will enter the tallies into Cornell Lab's eBird website. **Tally sheets must be returned to the library by February 24, 2025 to be included in the library count.** Or, if you prefer, you may enter your tally on your own through the **Merlin Bird ID by Cornell App** or through the **eBird website or app**. Identifying Birds

Don't worry if you can't identify all the birds you see. If you don't know the name of the species, **DON'T GUESS!** For help identifying birds, check out any of the bird field guides, a bird watching kit, or binoculars from the library or consult these online resources and apps:

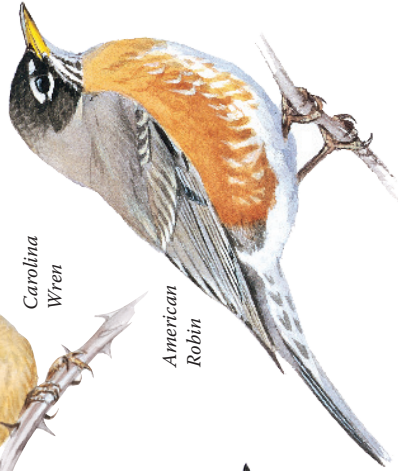
